Traveling West

Learn about people on the move by completing one of the following activities or projects.

Reading and Writing:

- 1. Write a book report on a novel, biography, or work of nonfiction from this time period. Examples are *Little House on the Prairie, Rachel's Journal, the Ballad of Lucy Whipple.* Nonfiction selections involving the Oregon Trail, The Pony Express, The Donner Party, etc.
- 2. Write an original story, narrative poem or diary that takes place during the 1840's to 1850's.
- 3. Create a scrapbook, similar to *Rachel's Journal* that would include illustrations and souvenirs that an early pioneer would have had.
- 4. Write a short research report about life on the Oregon Trail.

Illustrating:

- 1. Draw pictures of a day in the life of a pioneer along the trail starting from the morning until going to bed at night. Write captions for each one.
- 2. Illustrate a supply list that shows all the provisions a family would need to take on their journey to their new home.
- 3. Make a collage of photos, internet pictures and illustrations of the Oregon Trail. Include a map showing the trails across they took west. Include captions.

Build a Model:

- 1. Make a model of a covered wagon.
- 2. Making a diorama of life along the trail.

Cooking and Crafts:

- 1. Copy down the recipe and prepare a food from that time period such as learning how to churn butter or something that would be cooked over a campfire. Bring it in to share with the class.
- 2. Stitch a small sampler.
- 3. Sew a small quilt or quilt block.
- 4. Make a rag doll.
- 5. Make a pioneer girl bonnet.

Presentation:

1. Make a single concept video or skit showing something that would have happened to the early pioneers (no longer than a few minutes).
